November Guest Speaker, Lucas Holman, Discussed Holiday Plants

With the help of his daughter, Lucas Holman provided an informative lecture about holiday plants including poinsettias, cacti (Christmas and Thanksgiving), amaryllis, African violet, and cyclamen. Lucas is the Wilson County Extension Agent at UT TSU.



A few of his tidbits included that to get the colorful bracts on the poinsettia, the plant needs to be in the dark from roughly 5 PM till 8 AM each night beginning in October. This routine should be followed until Thanksgiving. Similarly, the cacti (both types) need about 12 hours of continuous dark to bloom. During the day, keep it in indirect light. It may take 12 weeks for the blooms to appear so adjust your timing accordingly.



After the amaryllis blooms drop, leave the leaves until they die off (like spring bulbs). When watering the African violet, be sure to avoid getting water on the leaves.

PUTNAM COUNTY MASTER GARDENER MONTHLY MEETING
NOVEMBER 16, 2020

President Vicky Draper called the virtual meeting to order. She introduced Lucas Holman, Wilson County Extension Agent. He has been a guest speaker several times over the years. He always does a wonderful job. His presentation was on "Holiday Plants." There were 26 members who participated in the virtual meeting.

The first Holiday Plant he discussed was Poinsettia. It is the number one selling holiday plant in the United States. Most of our plants sold locally comes from California. It is native to Central America and was discovered by Joel Poinsett, the first Ambassador to Mexico in 1820. There are more than 100 varieties. Also, Poinsettia are not poisonous. He discussed and answered questions on how to care for the plant.

The next Holiday plants he discussed were the Christmas and Thanksgiving cactus. The difference between the plants is the leaves. The Thanksgiving cactus has a forked leaf, and the Christmas cactus has a round leaf. The plants are native to Brazil. It was introduced around 1818 to Europe. It needs 12 hours of continuous dark and that is why they bloom when the days become shorter. He discussed and answered members questions on how to care for the plant.

Over ten million Amaryllis bulbs are imported every year. There are over 600 varieties. Amaryllis comes from the Greek word, "Knight Star". It is native to South Africa. They can bloom up to seventy-five years. There are two cycles in its growth to make it bloom. First period is the period of recovery where the foliage will grow, and the second period is the period of dormancy where the plant will go dormant (last two months). Lucas discussed and answered questions concerning the care of the Amaryllis.

The last two plants that he discussed was the Cyclamen and the African Violet. Cyclamen comes from the Greek word "Kyklo" meaning circle. This plant is sold during Valentines. The African Violet was discovered in 1892 and comes from Tanzania. A nursery in Louisiana realized the commercial potential of this plant and is the main distributor to nurseries and retail stores. He discussed and answered questions on how to care for each plant.

Pat O'Mara, Treasurer, gave a report. The only expense incurred was \$27.38 from the Granville Halloween project.

New Business

President Draper had been in contact with the Fair Board. The County Commission voted to wait and not sale the fairgrounds until after the August Putnam County Fair. This gives our club time to plan for the move. She stated that at 1:00 on Tuesday and Thursday there would be a workday to clean and organize the fair building for the move. She encouraged members participate especially if you need volunteer hours.

Also, she thanked the members who worked on the Ag building and the Farmers Market grounds. She stated they have never looked so good.

She told the members that the December meeting will be held virtually on December 14th. She asked members to wear festive hats, ugly sweaters or both. There will be door prizes. Also, she is planning for surprise.

Serina Wells announced that she has Amaryllis plants to sale for the Holidays. The cost is \$35 to \$40. She will post on her website.
